

Policy Design and Delivery: Innovation and Scaling

COURSE B OUTLINE

This course will prepare you to engage in policy innovation and scaling – two of the most important and challenging policy design processes, which will stretch your individual abilities, those of your colleagues and organization, and invite resistance and risk. Policy innovation is a deliberate process of trying new things to drive towards positive change in your context; scaling is the process by which you bring successful policy innovations to broader audiences. In this course, you will learn concrete tactics for building innovative policy solutions within dynamic systems, and develop skills to test and iterate innovation. You will discover the paths through which solutions can scale, and acquire strategies for navigating the sensitive political and organizational aspects of innovation and scaling.
